The teachings of luminaries like Sushrut, Aryabhatta, Panini, and Chanakya exemplify the integration of ethical considerations into scholarly pursuits (Nikam, 2025). This tradition continued through the medieval period with the establishment of pathshalas and madarsas, which combined religious and moral teachings with academic instruction. These institutions

embodied a holistic model of education that went beyond utilitarian outcomes (Ghonge *et al.*, 2021). They nurtured responsible and ethical individuals who could contribute positively to society.

Post-independence, India recognized the need to reform its education system to align with its cultural ethos and contemporary needs. The National Policy on Education (NPE) of 1968, and its subsequent revisions in 1986 and 1992, underscored the importance of inculcating values such as secularism, democracy, and respect for human dignity.
