To protect the Dalit rights, he used a variety of rules and methods. Ambedkar began a fight against Dalit prejudice through public opinion in publications, including Mook Nayak, Bahishkrit Bharat, which he founded to promote Dalit rights. He also started one of the well known Dalit rights was Vaikom Satyagraha In Travancore, Maharashtra, which allows the Dalits' right to worship in Hindu temples. The Dalit rally was organized for legal entitlement to use water from Chowdar tank. This how Ambedkar championed workers and peasants rights. During 1930's, when Ambedkar founded Independent Labour Party and championed the cause of tenants in Maharashtra's Konkan region. Ambedkar was a strong fighter for the cause of Dalits fighting tirelessly for their Dalit rights. He highlighted the economic exploitation faced by Dalits. In order to empower Dalits and socially integrate them, All sorts of social evils must be eradicated. Ambedkar advised social reforms to secure equality, liberty, and fraternity in India.

In Ambedkar's social reform efforts the intersection of caste and gender. Ambedkar and Dalit Movement discusses acknowledgment of the oppression of Dalit women and also his work for gender equality along with caste-based liberation. Ambedkar's support for women's rights of property ownership, and includes women in the fight for social justice. Ambedkar worked for women's rights that oppression of gender and caste are interconnected. He believed with out gender equality the social justice can't be achieved. Ambedkar's work on women's empowerment were both legal and social. Ambedkar's major effort was the Hindu Code Bill 1951, deals with marriage reform, inheritance, and property rights for women. The Hindu Code Bill encountered strong opposition and many of its provisions were later introduced into Indian law laying the foundation for policies of modern gender justice. Ambedkar work on labor code laws includes maternity benefit act, equal remuneration act, protected workplace for women are in place. He emphasized for gender equality women's education is the main factor Ambedkar policy of girls access to schools, colleges and professional way. His feminist ideology to inspire contemporary social work that integrate legal practice to protect women's rights.

5. Religion and Social Reform

Ambedkar the religious way to reform Dalits and Politics of Modern India.
