

Kudumbashree and Women's Economic Development: A Study of Empowerment and Livelihood Enhancement in Kerala

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Abstract

This research paper discusses how Kudumbashree has improved the economic development of women in the area by offering microfinance and entrepreneurship programs as well as empowerment programs. The results show that there are great gains in income, employment, and financial inclusion among women. Inclusive growth and sustainable development is an essential part of the economic development of women. In India, there are several governmental programs that have been carried out to empower women economically, socially and politically. One of the most extensive women-based poverty alleviation and empowerment programmes in the world is Kudumbashree, initiated by the Government of Kerala in the year 1998. 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1. Introduction

Kudumbashree is a women empowerment and poverty eradication programme in Kerala. It is concerned with enhancing the economic engagement of women by use of self-help groups and micro-enterprises. It has over the years ventured into various sectors including agriculture, food processing, retail and service industries. 2. Review of Literature

In a study of community-based poverty eradication programmes in Kerala, **Kadiyala (2004)** discovered that the decentralized nature of Kudumbashree allows women to be actively involved in local governance and decision-making related to the economy. The research has stressed that the programme leads to grassroots democracy and collective empowerment.

Devika and Thampi (2007) placed Kudumbashree in the prism of gender and maintained that the program transcends beyond income production as it transforms gender relations at the household and community level. Their results point to the fact that women who are involved in Kudumbashree feel more autonomous, self-assured, and socialized.

A research by **Rajasekharan and Veeramani (2011)** on microfinance projects in Kerala established that Kudumbashree has been very effective in enhancing financial inclusion of women who are marginalized. This study has found that dependency on informal lenders has been lowered by access to credit via self-help groups and savings habits have been enhanced.

Mukherjee (2012) noted that micro-enterprises run by Kudumbashree help in generating sustainable livelihoods. The study however indicated that most businesses are struggling with the inability to connect with the market, poor training, and poor scalability.

Nair and Sagarani (2013) concentrated on the entrepreneurial development dimension of Kudumbashree and discovered that the women entrepreneurs enrolled in the programme exhibit better managerial and leadership competencies. The research also highlighted the need to continually train and support the institutions.

Harilal and Joseph (2014) analyzed the economic performance of Kudumbashree and discovered that it has played a great role in the reduction of poverty in Kerala. The paper has observed that women have been able to gain access to income-generating activities, which have enhanced household consumption and the general well-being.

John (2015) examined how Kudumbashree has helped women to increase their involvement in local governance. The research established that women members take an active part in the decision-making process at the community level, which reinforces democratic institutions.

Thomas and Rajendran (2016) have examined the effectiveness of self-help groups and came to the conclusion that SHG model of Kudumbashree fosters collective responsibility, peer support, and financial discipline. The paper has emphasized that the group-based lending lowers the default rate and promotes accountability.

Nambisan (2018) studied how Kudumbashree encourages rural entrepreneurship and discovered that the programme has established many micro-enterprises in the agricultural, food processing and service industries. But the research underlined the necessity of improved marketing and technological incorporation.

The article by **George and Haridas (2019)** examined the social impact of Kudumbashree and discovered that the program has enhanced the access of women to education, health, and social welfare initiatives. The researchers also found that the involvement of women in Kudumbashree results in the success of family welfare and child education.

Husain and Nair (2025) reported that Kudumbashree encourages self-reliance and empowers women by training and employing them as well as conducting income-generating operations. The paper has stressed on the significance of integrated development that encompasses education, health, and economic involvement.

Jose (2015) emphasized that Kudumbashree is crucial in improving the socio-economic conditions of women by increasing their income, living standards, and education and health accessibility.

Thelekkatte et al. (2025) found that the programme helps women to be active in economic activity by assisting them in skill development and micro-enterprise development.

Panackal et al. (2016) described the theoretical background of self-help groups, according to which the involvement in such groups enhances the social recognition of women, their decision-making capacity, and entrepreneurial abilities of women .

Nambath (2012) conducted an analysis on the role of micro-enterprises under Kudumbashree and discovered that they play a major role in reducing poverty and creation of jobs with a small amount of capital outlay.

3. Theoretical Framework

The theoretical perspectives that the study is founded on are the following:

3.1 Empowerment Theory Empowerment theory

Is aimed at enhancing the ability of people to make decisions and convert them into expected results. Kudumbashree increases the empowerment of women, through availing resources, skills and platforms of decision making.

3.2 Microfinance Theory

The theory of microfinance focuses on delivering financial services to low-income people. The microcredit system at Kudumbashree empowers women to establish small enterprises and raise their levels of income.

3.3 Self-Help Group (SHG) Model.

SHG model encourages group savings, credit and mutual assistance. The NHGs of Kudumbashree serve as SHGs, which support financial inclusion and social cohesion.

3.4 Sustainable Livelihood Framework

The framework is aimed at improving the capabilities, assets and activities of people needed to earn a living. Skill development and entrepreneurship are some of the ways Kudumbashree helps in the sustainability of livelihoods.
