Gordon W. Allport, through the Contact Hypothesis, argues that social prejudice and stereotypes reduce when groups interact under healthy conditions. Applied to gender relations, this theory suggests that respectful interaction between boys and girls may reduce fear, misunderstanding, and social bias.

Recent reports of the World Economic Forum, World Bank, International labour organization, and UN Women have highlighted the importance of gender equality, women's workforce participation, and inclusive work environments for economic growth and social development.

3. Research Gap

Existing literature mainly focuses on gender equality, organizational behaviour, and workforce participation separately. Restrictive attitude may therefore reduce professional efficiency and reinforce gender stereotypes. However, the study does not argue that unrestricted interaction alone guarantees social progress. Ethical values, personal responsibility, mutual respect, and family support remain important for maintaining healthy social relationships. Therefore, a balanced approach is necessary in which cultural values are respected while encouraging open communication, gender equality, and responsible social behavior. Educational institutions, families, and society should work together to promote understanding rather than fear and misunderstanding regarding gender interaction.

11. Conclusion
